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Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, occurs on March 2 this year.

Lent is a 40-day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter (April 17). During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ.

Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. Contemplate the meaning and origins of the Lenten fasting tradition in this reflection. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs."

COME TO MEJacqueline Henss

Ash Wednesday, March 2, marks the Lenten preparation of our hearts and souls for the celebration of our Redemption on Easter. Our Blessed Lord, desiring that we trust completely in His Merciful Love so intrinsically connected with His passion, death and resurrection, asked for the establishment of a Feast of His Divine Mercy. "It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter" (St. Faustina's Diary 49). "On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls

... The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment "(699).

The Image with the signature, *Jesus, I trust in You*, to be displayed and venerated at the Sunday Feast was instituted by Our Lord as a "vessel with which (people) are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy" (327).

Jesus commanded St. Faustina to "Speak to the world about My mercy; let all mankind recognize My unfathomable mercy. It is a sign for the end times; after it will come the day of justice. While there is still time, let them have recourse to the fount of My mercy; let them profit from the Blood and Water which gushed forth for them" (848). "On the cross, the fountain of My mercy was opened wide by the lance for all souls – no one have I excluded!" (1182).

Following St. Faustina's canonization in 2000, Pope St. John Paul II established the universal Feast as Jesus requested. (Mother Church also offers a plenary indulgence, with the usual conditions.)

This year, the Feast of Mercy is April 24, the Octave day of Easter. CATHEDRAL BASILICA OF ST. AUGUSTINE

My daughter and I visited another daughter in St. Augustine, Florida. St. Augustine claims to be the oldest city in the U.S.

While we were there we walked through the Cathedral Basilica of St. Augustine. This Cathedral is beautiful and has amazing stained glass windows. The history is very interesting. It has Spanish roots, and the original churches burned down four times from 1586 to 1887 when it was rebuilt and expanded in the Spanish mission styling.

CHURCHES OF EUROPE

Duomo Santa Maria Del Fiore (Florence, Italy)

Begun in 1296 in the Gothic style and completed in 1436, The Basilica di Santa Maria del Fiore is Florence's beautiful cathedral and symbol of the city and the fourth largest in Europe. It stands tall over the city with its magnificent Renaissance dome, remaining the largest brick dome ever constructed. The climb to the top (463 steps) is not for the faint of heart, but the view is superb.





<u>Jakobskirche (St. Jakob's Church), Rothenburg ob der Tauber (Bavaria)</u>

St. James, a Lutheran church in Rothenburg ob der Tauber, Bavaria, is one of the churches on the pilgrimage route to St. James Church in Santiago de Compostela, Spain. Built in the High-Gothic style, the church is famous for its high altar and religious artwork St. James was built between 1311-



1484 which means it probably was a Catholic Church before the Reformation. The famous altar piece contains a relic: a drop of Christ's blood. In 1499, Rothenburg's town council ordered Tilman Riemenschneider, the famous sculptor and woodcarver from Würzburg, to build an altar to house this relic.

This central panel of the altar depicts the Last Supper. The central figure here, however, is Judas rather than Jesus.
