It is rooted in a culture we continue to build around our Core Values of Generous Service, Welcoming Arms, and Open Hearts. By our willingness to serve, invite people into our parish community, and love them most especially by our prayers, our parish is moving in greater harmony with the Holy Spirit.

What should our response be? Gratitude. Gratitude that moves the heart to be a gift to God and our neighbor. I pray as you spend some time pondering this last year of parish life, you too may rejoice and in thanksgiving, commit to another year of stewardship as disciples and as parishioners of St. Katharine Drexel Parish.

One of the most important aspects of our parish life is how we love the poor among us. I am exceedingly proud of the efforts of so many of you to care for those among us who have great material needs.


This past year the Society of St. Vincent de Paul has served 1,730 people in need and distributed over \$93,000 in assistance.

# What is the Clear Path of Discipleship?

The Clear Path of Discipleship is the framework so Missionary Disciples can grow in our parish. It provides the path for someone to come to know Christ and to make Him known in our local community. At the Thrive Step, one is given the strength to lead others into friendship with Christ and help them become Missionary Disciples. All of these steps help us to fulfill our Parish Mission to come to know Christ and make Him known to all.


#### **THRIVE**
