ADVENT

What Is Advent? History & Meaning

Advent begins on Sunday, November 28. Think you know what Advent is all about? Read on; there's more to it than you think. The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming," which is a translation of the Greek word *parousia*. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul,

Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1). During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration; originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of the world. It was not until the Middle Ages that the Advent season was explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas.

Advent Liturgy and Practice

To balance the two elements of remembrance and anticipation, the first two Sundays in Advent look forward to Christ's second coming, and the last two look backward to remember Christ's first coming. Over the course of the four weeks, Scripture readings move from passages about Christ's return in judgment to Old Testament passages about the expectation of the coming Messiah to New Testament passages about the announcements of Christ's arrival by John the Baptist and the Angels.

The Advent wreath first appeared in Germany in 1839. A Lutheran minister working at a mission for children created a wreath out of the wheel of a cart. He placed twenty small red candles and four large white candles inside the ring. The red candles were lit on weekdays and the four white candles were lit on Sundays. Eventually, the Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath.

The most common Advent candle tradition involves four candles. A new candle is lit on each of the four Sundays before Christmas. Each candle represents something different. The four candles traditionally represent hope, faith, joy, and peace. The first, second, and fourth candles are purple; the third candle is rose-colored.

The Memorare

We are told that, at about the age of three years, our Blessed Mother was presented by her parents to God in the Temple, where she lived until betrothed to St. Joseph. The Church usually celebrates this event, November 21, but this year it falls on Sunday. Then, on December 8 we celebrate the *Immaculate Conception of Mary*, a holy day of obligation. It seems an ideal time to highlight an intercessory prayer of Mary, the *Memorare*. Coming through Jesus' Mother is the pathway to His Sacred Heart.

For those who haven't worked the *Memorare* into their daily prayers, either of these celebrations is an ideal time to begin. Always remember that the *Memorare* contains the promise that no request will go unanswered. Memorare is the Latin word for remember, the opening word of the prayer.

St. Teresa of Calcutta, the prayer's champion, confirmed the forthcoming of a reply to anyone who prays the *Memorare* with complete trust in Mary's help. The circumstances matter not, as shown by the following.

In Rome during the Holy Year (1984) thousands of people gathered in the pouring rain awaiting the celebration of Mass by the Holy Father. Mother Teresa and her sisters began to pray a novena of *Memorares* in thanksgiving for beautiful weather. She relates, "As we said two, it started to pour more rain. We said the third ... sixth ... the eighth, and when we finished the ninth, we saw that all the umbrellas were closed."

St. Francis De Sales, while a student in 1580, was experiencing spiritual torments which disappeared after imploring Mary's help through the *Memorare*. He later authored the *Introduction to a Devout Life,* beloved by many.

I know of a couple who began praying the prayer together while dating. Now married, they have adopted the *Memorare* as their bedtime prayer; the last words they speak to each other before sleep is this prayer.
